Wednesday Evening Soup Dinners and Mid-Week Lenten Services

Christians have celebrated the 40-day season of Lent since the early times of the church. It is a time to take a deep dive into the stories of

Jesus and his ministry and teachings. This Lent, the Mid-Week Services focus on the stories of five people whose lives were changed by their encounter with Jesus. Each service will contain prayers, Bible readings, hymns, and a dramatic monologue from each of the five persons. The services begin at **7:00 pm**, and are about thirty minutes long and reflective in nature.

The three remaining stories are:

March 26	Jesus Teaches the Rabbi (Teacher) Nicodemus
April 2	Jesus Touches and Heals a Man
April 9	A Roman Army Officer Comes to Faith

Each service will be preceded by at **6:00 pm** with a community soup and sandwich dinner, (bring your own sandwich) hosted by a church group.



Services for Holy Week and Easter

Holy Week is a series of worship services which relive the final climatic events of Jesus Christ's life.

At the Palm/Passion service, we hear again the story of both Jesus' triumphant entry into Jerusalem, when he was acclaimed by the crowds as the Messiah, and the full reading of the Passion Narrative, which recounts Jesus' betrayal, trial, and crucifixion.

At the Maundy Thursday service, we experience Jesus' final meal with his disciples, the Last Supper, and the institution of the Sacrament of Holy Communion.

On Good Friday, the Tenebrae service takes us from light to darkness, as we hear and ponder the seven last words Jesus uttered from the Cross.

Easter is the culmination of the Holy Week journey, as we celebrate the resurrection of Jesus. He had been buried in the tomb for three days. Now he is resurrected to new life by God the Father's power and joyfully returns to see his disciples and friends.

The free concert is on **Friday, April 11, 7:00 pm, at Blessed Sacrament Cathedral, downtown Greensburg.** The two works are "The Passion of St. Matthew," and the world premiere of "Stabat Mater," both by Nancy Galbraith, a contemporary Pittsburgh-based Lutheran composer. Directed by Tom Octave, and Nancy Finke Sheehan as the accompanist. Pastor Ed also sings in the choir.

Election of a New Bishop of the Synod in June

Holy Week Taize Service Wednesday April 16 7 pm

Holy Week, starting with Palm Sunday and ending with Easter, is the culmination of the Christian liturgical year. For a number of years, Good Shepherd has held a Taize service on the Wednesday night of Holy Week. On the night before the start of the Three Great Days (Maundy Thursday, Good Friday, and Easter), we have a quiet and reflective service focused on the theme of love.

The name "Taize" comes from an ecumenical monastic community in France whose 100 plus members come from 30 different countries and many different Christian denominations, Roman Catholic and Protestant and Orthodox. Over the 85 years of the community's existence, they have developed a unique worship style that involves easily learned chants. The Taize service at Good Shepherd combines these chants with readings from the New Testament focused on the primacy of love: the love Jesus had + for his disciples, the love God continues to have for all people, the centrality of love to our understanding of who God is. At the end of the service, participants are encouraged to light candles in front of various icons for their own individual prayer intentions. There is also the opportunity to receive prayers for healing.

Everyone is welcome to this service that, we hope, will provide a quiet reminder of the centrality of love to the events of Holy Week.

Lenten offering envelopes will be available in the Commons Area on the table. Please return in the offering plate. If you would like to mail in a Lenten




offering, please indicate on envelope and check that it is for Lent and include your offering envelope #. All Lenten monies will go to Lutheran Disaster Relief.





SWPA Women of the ELCA Designated Outreach 2025:

At convention last May, a new 2025 Designated Outreach was elected: Robin's Home Veteran Services. They opened in April of 2020 and are

a transitional housing program providing a continuum of care for homeless, unstably housed and low income female veterans and their children. Headquartered in Butler they also serve the larger



surrounding area. Beyond housing, they offer peer support services and safe spaces for veterans to share their stories with empathetic support of one another. They address mental health and promote personal growth. By also running Veterans HEART Resource Center, they offer a range of services including education, employment assistance, healthcare advocacy and community engagement. Fondly Remembering Joan Billig

Joan Louise Billig, Good Shepherd's beloved church secretary during the 1970s, died October 10, 2024. Joan was born July 6, 1939 in Greenville, PA. A graduate of Penn High School, Joan worked briefly for General Electric until she married George Billig. In 1963, George accepted an engineering position with the Elliot Company and Joan and George moved to Greensburg where Joan served as Good Shepherd's church secretary for Pastor Goehrig. In 1980, Joan and George purchased the Vaccum Center in downtown Greensburg, where Joan worked first with George and later with her son, Brad, until she passed. At Joan's request, the family held a private burial service. Joan is survived by her husband George, their four children - Wendy, Lori, Brad, and Brenda - and their spouses, 7 grandchildren and 8 great grandchildren.

hardworking members of our church and touched the lives of many members.

Congratulations Bettie Davis

After many years as a college for men, Saint Vincent became a coeducational college. It welcomed its first women's class in 1983. In 2023, as part of its celebration to recognize 40 years of having women students at Saint Vincent College, it recognized "40 Women for 40 Years" at a Celebration Dinner in October 2023. Saint Vincent had over 200 nominees for this recognition from which the 40 were selected. One of those selected 40 women was Dr. Bettie Davis, a member of Good Shepherd and now retired faculty member but also Adjunct Lecturer in Chemistry at Saint Vincent.

In a booklet that described contributions of each of the 40 selected women, Bo Tokarski describes Bettie's as "For nonmajors, Bettie's "Chemistry and Crime" course became as a must-take, and students from across campus would be enthralled with learning more about their favorite crime assays as depicted in their favorite crime television shows, learning more about key aspects of chemistry that underlie the assays performed to solve crimes of arson, drugs or murder. Her dedication to advancement of education is evidenced by her continued support of the Collaborative Learning Program (CLP), which became a staple for continued knowledge-development and scientific practice for hundreds of students across the chemistry and biology disciplines, while also providing critical teaching skills to CLP facilitators who could then go on to become successful teaching assistants and/or professors themselves in higher education."

"Bettie's emphasis on mental health, her openness to speak about her own experience with mental health, became a backdrop of support for so many students who confided in her their own self-doubts and mental health struggles, providing a strong and courageous support to so many to help make it through even the toughest times as a student. Within the Saint Vincent community, there is no one I can think of who more exemplifies the Ten Benedictine Hallmarks upon which the foundation of Bearcat Nation is built. Most of all, it has been and always will be Bettie's love — love of science, love of students, love of the Saint Vincent campus— that make her the ideal candidate for the 40 Women for 40 Years honor. Her incredible personality, unwavering smile, extensive chemistry and biology knowledge, and kind heart make her unlike any other woman who has helped to shape as many lives as Dr. Bettie Davis has in STEM courses at Saint Vincent College.
